





Highlights of New Re-Opening Executive Order – Phase 4

- Retail customers can shop without appointments starting June 4.
- On June 8 restaurants can reopen to dine-in, 50% capacity, six feet apart and servers must wear masks.
- Day camps for children and pools can open June 8.
- Outdoor fitness classes, athletic practices, training sessions and games are allowed.
- Outside gatherings of no more than 100 people are allowed.
- In-home services such as house cleaning may resume.
- The following places must remain closed: movie theatres, gyms, indoor recreational facilities, nail and hair salons, barber shops₄

Citywide Re-entry Plan

- Departmental plans completed (service updates/staffing levels)
- Employee Town Hall meetings conducted
- Facility signage, floor markings, and way finding in progress
- Health check protocols implemented
- Website with City service updates is under construction for our community
- Working on Park amenities re-opening plan

City of Grand Rapids Recovery Update

Outdoor Space Activation Working Group - *Completed*

- City Commission authorizing resolution (5/21)
- Online “Outdoor Activation and Social Zones” guide
- Special events “fast app” for application submittal
- Introductory meetings with Corridor Improvement Authorities, Business Associations, etc. coordinated by Downtown Grand Rapids Inc. and Economic Development
- Plan to waive Special Event permit and barricading fees for Social Zones and Temporary Use permit fees for outdoor seating
- Media promotion

City of Grand Rapids Recovery Update

Outdoor Space Activation Working Group- *In Progress*

- Identifying coordinating organizations to apply for Social Zone permits
- Continuing media promotion
- Developing equipment rental cost reduction framework
- Continuing to monitor/advocate for State legislation to expand opportunities related to alcohol in Social Zones

Public Safety Update

- Over 40 cities have curfews in place, over 200 localities with civil unrest
- Emergency Operations Center mobilized for multiple operational periods
- Increased resources: Kent County Sheriff, Ottawa County Sheriff, East Grand Rapids, Kentwood, Wyoming, Walker, Michigan State Police
- Implemented Curfew
- Arrests (riot arrests 9/curfew arrests 24)
- Business damage (100+)
- Civil Emergency and Curfew Orders were effective May 31st at 7 pm and expired June 2 at 5 am
- National Guard was used to create a perimeter

Public Safety Recommendations

- Support National Guards demobilization since law and order re-established but maintain ability to recall
- Maintain curfew at 7 pm or extend to 8:30 pm through June 7
- Continue to rely on resources from Michigan State Police and other law enforcement partners as needed

Steps to Consider for Improving Community Police Relations

- Chief Payne will stand in solidarity and march with community on June 3rd at 4 pm and assist in event planning
- Chief Payne and Oversight and Public Accountability (OPA) will work together to establish a Community Police Advisory Council by June 6
- The City Manager, Police Chief, OPA, and the Equity and Engagement Office (OEE) will host an initial Virtual Town Hall to listen to community concerns and seek innovative solutions
- OPA will increase accountability by reviewing and releasing a comprehensive report and recommendations regarding the status of all prior community/police relations studies, recommendations, and commitments
- OPA and OEE to host events led by subject matter experts regarding processing and healing from trauma and vicarious trauma related to racism and use of force

Steps to consider for Improving Community and Police Relations (continued)

- OEE, OPA and Economic Development to work with the business community to increase summer job opportunities for youth
- OPA will create a Safety and Accountability Ambassador Program designed to train and equip community with the tools to promote safety and accountability
- OPA and OEE to host training sessions regarding being an ally in partnership with community
- OPA will work with community to review GRPD policies and practices with a focus on equity and innovation and recommend improvements
- OEE will increase and enhance training related to equity, justice, implicit bias and other related topics for City Staff
- OPA to complete a strategic plan and implement additional strategies to increase restorative justice programming, elevating community voice, and public safety engagement
